What Does My Kindergartner Do All Day?

Our daily schedule is always subject to change in order to meet the needs of the children. It can change to accommodate pull out classes such as ESL, Speech, and CCR. However, there are certain activities your child will do every day. These activities include the following:

- Whole group shared reading experiences in which students read texts with the teacher
- Whole group read aloud in which students listen to the teacher read
- Differentiated literacy stations and small group reading instruction
- Writing mini-lessons followed by independent writing time and student-teacher conferencing.
- Whole group math focus lessons followed by differentiated math stations and small group math instruction
- Whole group science or social students lessons followed by individual or small group learning experience
- Developmental stations such as blocks, home center, computer, and art

Will My Kindergartner Be Taught Socials Studies?

YES! Kindergartners begin an integrative approach of Social Studies by exploring aspects of self, others, families, and communities across the world. Our studies will focus on students understanding change over time; using geographic representations and terms to describe surroundings; understanding the interactions between humans and the environment; understanding basic economic concepts; understanding the roles of a citizen; and understanding how individuals are similar and different.

What Will My Kindergartner Learn in Math?

In Kindergarten, the big picture is NUMBER SENSE – using numbers, including written numerals, to represent quantities and to solve quantitative problems, such as counting objects in a set, counting out a given number of objects, comparing sets of numerals, and modeling simple joining (addition) and separating (subtraction) situations with sets of objects. Students will also describe their physical world using geometric ideas (shape, orientation, spatial relations) and vocabulary.
